

The City of Calmar on behalf of the city and our residents would like to state our objections to the proposed Alliant Electric Rate increase.

The City of Calmar is a city in Northeast Iowa of just under 1,000 residents. Of these residents over 40% are low to moderate income.

These residents' social security checks are not rising over 25% and the working people are not receiving a 25% pay increase. Most are not even getting a cost of living increase yet have to come up with over 25% more to pay for their electricity. There are some that will have to choose to pay their electric bill or buy groceries.

The City budgets each year for expenses, the notice of rate increase came after our budgets for 2019-2020 were certified to the State of Iowa. Our rate increases vary from 10.01 percent to 25.29 percent. The city has no way to raise our revenue to compensate for these large increases. We are currently paying Alliant between seven and twelve thousand dollars monthly already. Adding over 25% to these figures makes it very difficult for a small city to function and provide services to our residents.

We feel the electric rates were high before this increase. Maybe Alliant should cut back on their stockholders rate of return rather than raise the electric rates.

We are asking the Iowa Utility Board to deny Alliant's proposed rate increase.

In March the City of Everly and its residents received notification of Alliant energy's proposed Electric rate increase. This has created quite a storm of gossip, frustration and annoyance to be displayed in our small city of 603, with moderate to low income.

Our elderly patrons who are striving to stay in their homes find a 24.45% possible increase very stressful. Even being told the Iowa Utility Board would need to approve the increase, has not relieved the thoughts of trying to find "a place where they can cut back elsewhere." Dear IUB Board Members-

Alliant's proposed rate increase for 2020 is not acceptable. Their interim rate increase of 5.5% going into effect April 1, 2019 is very concerning as well. We are in the middle of our fiscal year. We don't budget for mid-year rate increases. I run the Marion Water department and receive electric bills from both Alliant and Linn County REC. I wish I could have all of my wells on REC power.

In FY17-18 I spent over \$319,000 for Alliant electricity to run the well pump motors to supply a community of 38,000 people with potable drinking water. We are a non-profit utility. We have no shareholders to share our profits with. Any profit we make on the sale of water is re-invested back into our aging infrastructure and normal operation and maintenance. Any increase in electricity costs are passed through to our water customers. If you allow this large electric rate increase go through, our customers will be hit twice. Once by the electric rate increase and from my water department raising water rates to pay for Alliant's high electricity rate increase.

For FY18-19 the monthly Alliant bills are trending 5.7% higher. July-February bills total \$253,720. I cannot conceive the 25.29% increase for the large general service accounts. How can MidAm and Linn REC supply electricity at more reasonable and competitive rates? What are they doing right and why is Alliant not as efficient?

I suggest the following items for you to consider:

- 1. Allow non-profit entities like the Marion Water Department that serve Alliant customers to have a lower rate increase so the customer is not getting hit with high rate increases from both Alliant and Marion Water Department.
- 2. Review Alliant's Large General Service tariff. They have a ratchet which is 75% of the highest billing demand determined during the previous 3 months. This causes a large financial burden on my utility because I will take a plant down for maintenance for 3-4 months. During this outage we are still billed at the 75% of the highest billing demand rate for the last three months. I'm still paying over \$4,000 per month for just having some lights on. I understand a base charge but Linn REC only charges roughly \$700 per month when I have a plant down for maintenance.
- 3. I would suggest/recommend to Alliant to consider hiring freezes and pay increase freezes/cuts to show their customers that they are trying to do everything possible to reduce this high rate increase.
- 4. Has Alliant had a neutral 3rd party evaluate their processes and staffing levels? Can they be leaner? Is there waste that can be cut? Have they done a compensation study recently to determine if they are overpaid/underpaid/overstaffed etc?

I understand inflation and cost of goods and services continue to increase. My two biggest expensive for the water utility is staffing and electricity. I can manage my staffing levels and expenses. I can't control my electricity costs.

I thank you for your time and consideration regarding this matter.

To Whom it May Concern:

I want to call to your attention the objections to the Alliant electric rate increase by the Wapello County Board of Supervisors.

The proposed increase could increase the electric bill of Wapello County by nearly \$50,000 a year. The City of Ottumwa's electric bill could increase about \$200,000. Indian Hills Community College which is in Wapello County could see an increase in their electric bill of nearly \$80,000.

The citizens of Wapello County through their property taxes will have to help pay these increases. On top of these increases the citizens of Wapello County are facing a 25% increase in their own residential bills.

Alliant has put more citizens of Wapello County in a situation of deciding on medication or their electric bill; or food or their electric bills. This rate increase of 25% is so unbelievable that one may think that Alliant doesn't really expect a 25% increase. However, by setting the request that high cutting it in half still leaves an unacceptable increase.

Wapello County is already at a distinct development disadvantage. If the John Deere plant in Ottumwa could be picked up and physically moved 26 miles to Oskaloosa, which has electric provided by MidAmerican, the electric bill would decrease by several hundred thousand dollars annually. The John Deere plant can't be picked up and set in Oskaloosa; however, other development opportunities looking at utility costs could save thousands of dollars by locating just 26 miles away.

In other years the Iowa Utility Board has made a reduction in the Alliant request. This time the request is so great that even a reduction is not acceptable. We strongly request the Iowa Utilities Board deny the Alliant electric rate increase request in all categories.

I am writing on behalf of the Board of Directors of the Ecumenical Community Center Foundation in Cedar Rapids to protest in the strongest possible terms the rate increase being proposed by Alliant Energy for electric service to our community. We ask that the Iowa Utilities Board NOT approve this request.

Alliant's proposed increase of 24.45% will impose an undue burden on both our clients and our operation. We supply as many as we can with assistance with their utility bills and rent, as well as addressing other critical needs. In addition to the rate increase, clients will also see increases in amounts expended for sales tax and the City of Cedar Rapids' franchise fee. Costs for operating our facility will also be accelerated. Since we are a non-profit, we have no rates to raise, but only cuts to make absent dramatic increases in contributions.

Under conditions of Alliant's proposed increase, we will have to reduce our services to the poor, adding to their burden. This is unjust for those whose financial existence is already precarious and who have the greatest needs and the least likelihood of having them met.

Honorable Board Members:

The purpose of this letter is to follow up my comments previously made on behalf of Fareway Stores, Inc. ("Fareway") at the May 23, 2019, Customer Comment Meeting in Cedar Rapids. By way of this letter, Fareway wishes to file a written objection to the proposed increase.

Alliant Energy ("Alliant") is a strong partner to Fareway. Without Alliant providing electricity, we would be unable to power our corporate campus facility in Boone, Iowa, or 38 other retail locations throughout the State of Iowa. Accordingly, when we received notice of Alliant's request for a base rate increase of 25.29% to Large General Service customers (such as Fareway), we started digging into the data without predetermined conclusions. Based on our review, we've found as follows:

- 1. This proposed rate increase will cost Fareway (and other similar sized companies) hundreds of thousands of dollars per year without any additional benefit or change in service.
- 2. We compared two Fareway stores (located 35 miles apart) of similar age and size, with similar utility usage, and found that the store serviced by Alliant already costs approximately 25% more than the store serviced by MidAmerican, even prior to the interim rate increase by Alliant effective April 1, 2019.
- 3. The rebate/credit Fareway receives as a result of Alliant's investments in renewable energy is reducing our monthly invoices by approximately 5%. However, based on our discussions with Alliant, it appears other rebates/credits (e.g. Interrupt Credits) will likely be reduced in the future. This will also increase our monthly bills. Stated differently, we are not confident the renewable energy rebate will even closely offset the rate increase. But even if it does, as other credits are removed, the rate increase is much higher than the total rebates/credits offered.

4. Ultimately, we were unable to understand the <u>specific</u> rationale for the 25.29% proposed increase.

Fareway's concern with the proposed increase is twofold. First, the proposed rate increase will have a trickle-down effect. If utility costs collectively rise by hundreds of thousands of dollars per year, it will affect the cost of goods for our customers and/or the wages paid to our employees as this kind of increase simply cannot be absorbed. Second, the proposed increase is not substantiated by the data; as the data shows Alliant rates are already higher than their local competitor and any credit Fareway is receiving from Alliant for funding their renewable energy investments is only a small fraction of the proposed increase (a 25.29% increase in base rates for a potential 5% return is a losing proposition to customers).

The Iowa Utilities Board Mission Statement states in part that the Iowa Utility Board "regulates utilities to ensure that reasonably priced...utility services are available to all Iowans." We feel this excessive increase fails in this mission.

Therefore, we respectfully request the Board reject the proposed 25.29% increase and instead adopt an increase in line with the interim increase in rates of 5.5%. This will continue to assist Alliant in their investment into renewable resources and other initiatives but without unreasonably increasing their already comparatively high rates.

In fact Alliant Energy has experienced net earnings growth from \$395.7M in 2014 to the reported 2018 net income, a 32% net income growth over four years. By Alliant Energy's own measurements their costs of investment are more than sufficiently met by their current revenue levels, and thus rates charged to its customers.

As of late the State had decided NOT to ensure numerous providers are reimbursed their costs, but instead reimburse providers substantially less than cost. The Montrose Health Center is a long-term care provider in Southeast Iowa. We provide resident health care to about 40 people daily. We annually file cost reports to the State, which are used to establish reimbursement rates for future services we provide Iowans covered by Medicaid. Starting in 2014 the State decided to reimburse us less than the costs of providing care through establishing a negative inflation rate adjustment against our costs of service. The inflation rate adjustment was established in our reimbursement formula to increase what the State would pay for services as the cost reports used to establish the reimbursement rates were up to two years old.

In 2017 the State issued a negative 9.807% inflation rate adjustment, thus paying us nearly 10% less than our costs of care from a report now two years old. In Montrose Health Center's case the State calculated our cost of care from our 9/30/2016 cost report to be \$154.56, yet the State established our base reimbursement level to be \$137.00. I've enclosed the State's report showing their calculations. The Add-on amount of \$10 is earmarked funds that need to be spent in a very specific way, and the Pass-through of \$1.36 is a reimbursed bed tax we pay that is not included in

our cost report. It is essentially a return of a non-deductible tax we pay to the State.

I strongly suggest that Alliant Energy is sufficiently paid by customers at a financial level which supports the very activities Alliant Energy is asserting it needs a rate increase to cover. Any rate increase would add insult to injury to my business, the Iowans we provide care, and our 55 employees as the State will not reimburse us the rate increase Alliant Energy is seeking. I equally encourage the Iowa Utilities Board to have a public hearing regarding Alliant Energy's rate increase request.

Being a small, private organization, on an extremely limited budget, this rate increase will potentially create burdens on us, as well as the families that choose to send their children to us for a high-quality education.

Ottumwa is in one of the most repressed economies in the state. Wapello County is ranked 75th of 99 counties as far as wealth and Ottumwa is ranked #75 out of the top 100 cities of size for wealth with a medium income of only \$39,139.00. This means disposable income is not in abundance here and a rate increase will lessen that even more. As I'm sure you're aware, we already pay a considerably higher per kilowatt rate than our neighbors to the north in Oskaloosa, who are on Mid-American Energy.

I am deeply concerned by the unilateral rate increase proposed by Alliant Energy. Affecting our West Branch Iowa printing facility, this increase could have a catastrophic impact on our operation and employees.

We fully support expansion of wind and solar energy generation, but we support it where it makes economical sense. A 25.29% electricity rate increase would cost this operation \$44,364.47 per year. To our small company, this could be the difference between a profit and a loss. As a company that pays for health care of our 19 employees, proud to have just provided a 3% cost of living increase and other wage increases, this completely flies in the face of those efforts. We operate in an extremely competitive manufacturing market, shipping much of our product to states outside of Iowa.
