the job will be readvertised. Supervisors were apprised that in the Department of Public Health, Joanna Foor has been hired for the position of public health preparedness manager. Public Health Director Stefanie Wagaman said her department is now fully staffed. Jim Reeve, compensation board representative for the elected position of treasurer, has resigned. Linda Beck has been appointed by Treasurer Sandra Delaney to immediately ommend emergency management services changes that will improve ambulance coverage countywide. MCM will conduct a needs assessment to get the county to where it should be.

MCM is currently reviewing GIS data and call data (history and costs) provided by response agencies. MCM is surveying and developing its assessment tool with input from the EMS study committee, emergency management director, ambulance/fire departments, city representatives and dispatch personnel.

Further, any response agency outside the county, if called to help with a 911 situation in the county, will also be approached during these all-inclusive interview meetings.

Mike McGrady, who was also instrumental in setting up a new 911 radio system for Cedar county, said EMS issues in rural areas exist across the country. For example, the paramedic position requires two years of study. The reality is that after training and getting on-the-job experience, paramedics leave rural areas to go to urban better-paying jobs.

Another reality is that rural areas struggle with ambulance transport time. There is a big disconnect between when a dispatch call goes out and when an ambulance actually arrives at the scene of an emergency.

Supervisor Jeff Kaufmann asked whether rural communities are benefiting from Iowa's legislative action to permit jurisdictions to implement a limited tax levy revenue-creating

resource for EMS services. McGrady said that MCM's immediate efforts will be to offer strategies to stabilize an affordable ambulance service in rural Cedar county. For longterm fixes, legislative intervention still needs to address low insurance reimbursement rates.

EMA Director Jodi Freet is endeavoring to contact city representatives, EMS study committee members and response entities to attend interviews to get as much input generated as possible for MCM's report.

Other Business and Reports

MCM's McGrady also reported the new 911 communication tower sites have good layouts and good construction. "You will be impressed when you see them." The testing of the new radio equipment will occur at RACOM's Marshalltown site on Jan. 18.

Should Cedar county renew its \$450 dues to the NACO (National Association of Counties) organization? Supervisors will ask department officials about the advantage they are receiving for the cost of membership. The county's secondary roads department emphasizes the vital importance of receiving from area school districts their annual bus routes' maps. Even if not every construction project can avoid bus interference, the THE TIPTON CONSERVATIVE 17

county tries to time work to give alternative road travel options.

Early Childhood Iowa is encouraging development of more in-home daycare operations. Since state law requires licensure, there are grants for in-home providers to pay for training and licensing.

The transfer station new facilities are in operation. The old building is being demolished and removed. The public driveway is being widened. The lower-level driveway access is under construction.

Two documents were executed. One entails an annual 28E agreement between the county treasurer and the DOT for operation of the drivers' license service. The county is responsible for equipment required.

The other document will involve Dec. 6 and 13 public hearing dates for Ordinance 64. which pertains to creation of a Pioneer Cemetery Commission. It already exists in Cedar county. The Pioneer Cemetery Commission bylaws largely mirror this 2014 oversight of this state requirement. The ordinance creation, after the fact, is a formality.

Unfinished \$24.5M project 'getting ridiculous' - super

WB school leaders consider getting lawyers involved

School leaders last week expressed impatience with Conlon Construction since work remains on the \$24.5 million project still 15 months after moving into the new West Branch High School.

Superintendent Marty Jimmerson told the West Branch Board of Education at its Nov. 14 meeting that the contractors "need to get their act together."

"Conlon is not living up to the deal at this point in time," he said.

The school district called in the heating, air conditioning, and ventilation contractor to finish that aspect of the work. Jimmerson also noted that drywall, exterior signage, and benches all remain unfinished.

He said OPN Architects came in to redo the punch list for the general contractor.

"Things are not getting done," Jimmerson said. "We're trying to hold their feet to the fire. This is getting ridiculous. ... The kids and our staff and this community deserve better."

The superintendent said the school district may need to involve attorneys. "We've had some inter-

esting meetings, to say the least," Jimmerson said, referring to talking to contractors.

Board President Greg Hetrick asked if the school district has "options," like bringing in different contractors.

"It's been a year and a half," he said. "We may want to at least dip our toe into that water."

Jimmerson said he had an "initial conversation' with the school attorney.

A message seeking comment left at Conlon Construction's Coralville office was not returned by press time.

The school district broke ground in the summer of 2020 and high school students moved into the addition in August 2021 and the school district hosted an open house in September 2021.

Middle school pupils moved into the renovated old high school in January 2022; the new auditorium opened at the same time, though it was not fully finished.





Pie safes were common in 19th-century kitchens

Part of the fun of antiques is learning about how people lived in the past. You can often find new uses for items whose purposes have become obsolete.

This softwood cupboard with painted and punched tin panels sold for \$384 at Conestoga Auctions. It's a pie safe, which is not something you would see in a kitchen today but was common in the 19th century.

The name "pie safe" may conjure up images of a locked box to keep Thanksgiving desserts out of reach, not to mention out of sight, and reduce the temptation to overindulge. In reality, they weren't that drastic; they were meant to keep out bugs, vermin and mold rather than prying fingers.

Pie safes had tin panels on the doors and sides, so mice couldn't chew their way in for an illicit treat. The panels had holes punched in them, creating ventilation to prevent mold. The holes were too small and the edges too sharp to allow bugs to fly through. Like many features of country furniture, the tin panels were both functional and decorative. The punched holes often formed a design or picture. Here, each panel has a circular pattern enhanced by a painted geometric design.

Q: When I was little, I played with dolls that originally belonged to my mother and aunt. There were early Barbies, Madame Alexander dolls, and I think a Ginny doll. I have seen similar dolls sell

playing: messed-up hair, discolored spots, broken jewelry, worn paint, damaged clothes, even a missing finger! Do dolls in "played with" condition sell? Can they be repaired?

A: If you are planning to sell a doll, don't have it restored. Collectors will want to see its current condition, and dealers can have dolls restored for a lower price than you can. Do not restore a doll yourself if you are not a specialist. Don't repaint a doll's head; it lowers the value. Don't wash or style a vinyl doll's hair. Keep the broken jewelry and old doll clothes; accessories add value to a doll, even if they are in worn condition. There are many "doll hospitals" where professionals repair and restore antique dolls. You can find some, along with doll clubs and other resources, in the Kovels.com business directory.

Q: I have a mechanical music box with a label reading, "Exposition 1878 J Phalibois Paris Pieces Mecaniques, Fantasies A Musiques." The scene depicts a farm girl feeding chickens. Her hand moves, the rabbit's head moves, the chickens move and the cat's head moves. Or, they are all supposed to move, but they need repair. There is a small music box that had a string attached to make it play. It's now detached and the music box needs a good cleaning. It's a treasured piece from my late husband's grandmother's house. I'd like to give it to my son and daughter-in-law. What can you tell me about it?

making "le tableau mecanique" or mechanical scenes that included people or animals with moving parts. Many were made with music boxes. Mechanical scenes were made as early as the 15th century, but the "golden age" of production was in the 19th century, when many elaborate mechanical toys and dolls were made. Figures with mechanized parts are called "automatons." Phalibois automatons were exhibited at the Paris Exposition in 1878. The French words on the label on your music box translate as "Mechanical Pieces, Fantasies To Music." Jean-Marie retired in 1893 and his son, Henry, took over. The company stopped making automatons in 1925. Some automatons sell for over \$1,000. Check auction sites or contact an auction house to see what your music box might sell for. website, Kovels.com. Q: I have a 20-piece set of the initials "R" and "C," and is stamped "Fr. Zimmermann, Breslau" on the back of each piece. What can you tell me about the maker and age of this set?

A: This crown and crossed swords mark was used by Rosenthal China. The company was founded by Philip Rosenthal in 1879. It began as a porcelain-decorating company, using blanks made by other companies. In 1891, Rosenthal opened his factory in Selb, Bavaria, Germany, and began making porcelain. The company was sold to the Waterford Wedgwood Group

in 1998. It became part of the Arcturus Group in 2009. The "Fr. Zimmermann, Breslau" stamp is the decorator's mark. Breslau became Wroclaw, Poland, after World War II. Variations of this Rosenthal mark were used from 1898 to 1906. The marks indicate that the china was sold in Germany and not meant for export to the U.S. The country of origin had to be listed on goods coming into the U.S. after the passage of the McKinley Act of 1891.

"A number of people said they would like to make a donation, but do not need any more stuff," said Clarke. "They'd rather have cash," added Meyer.





Trump's presidential run faces legal challenges

WASHINGTON — Donald Trump faces an unprecedented effort to disqualify him from being on the ballot again over his role in the Jan. 6 attack on the U.S. Capitol, raising the specter of legal chaos in the 2024 election long before voters go to the polls.

Advocacy groups have vowed to challenge Trump's third presidential bid in multiple states under a post-Civil War measure that bars individuals from holding office if they pledged to uphold the U.S. Constitution and then "engaged in insurrection or rebellion."

It's a relatively untested area of law. Conflicting decisions from election officials and state and federal judges could mean Trump doesn't appear on the ballot in every jurisdiction, leaving the outcome of the Republican primary or even the general election in limbo.

"We could have 51 jurisdictions coming out differently, really, on the same evidence," said Marcy Kahn, a former appellate judge who led a New York City Bar Association task force to study the issue. "It really would be a constitutional crisis."

Section 3 of the 14th Amendment, which was ratified in 1868, was drafted with ex-Confederate officeholders in mind. It took on new life after Trump supporters attacked the Capitol and tried to prevent Congress from certifying

the 2020 presidential election, spurred by Trump and prominent GOP officials' baseless claims of widespread election fraud.

An early round of efforts to disqualify Republicans who backed Trump's "Stop the Steal" movement largely failed, but yielded court rulings with wins and losses for both sides. Those cases offered a glimpse at novel issues likely to come up in a push to stop an expresident seeking another term.

"Every legal option is on the table," said Donald Sherman, chief legal counsel and vice president of Citizens For Responsibility and Ethics in Washington, a nonprofit government watchdog group mobilizing to block Trump's candidacy. Within minutes of Trump's announcement Tuesday night making his candidacy official, CREW and two other advocacy groups, Free Speech for People and Mi Familia Vota, put out statements reaffirming plans to try to disqualify Trump from serving.

There's no uniform process for Section 3 ballot contests. Objections to Trump's candidacy would unfold on a state-bystate basis before a mix of election officials and state courts. Trump could bring parallel federal court action to try to halt those proceedings. Losing parties could ask the U.S. Supreme Court to intervene.

House Democrats have pending bills to empower the Justice Department to bring insurrection disqualification cases in federal court, and one that would also allow private citizens to sue. The likelihood that Republicans reclaim the House may doom that effort for the 2024 election cycle.

James Bopp Jr., an Indiana-based attorney who represented Republican Representatives Marjorie Taylor Greene and Madison Cawthorn against disqualification efforts in Georgia and North Carolina, was dismissive of the legal strength of Section 3 challenges to Trump's candidacy.

He accused groups of using ballot contests to drain candidate resources, generate media coverage of "scandalous and false accusations," and disrupt elections.

Biden to ask Supreme Court to take up student debt

WASHINGTON — The Biden administration plans to ask the Supreme Court to reinstate the president's student debt cancellation plan, according to a Thursday legal filing warning that Americans will face financial strain if the plan remains stalled in court when loan payments are scheduled to restart in January.

The Justice Department is fighting to keep Biden's plan alive after it was halted by two federal courts in recent weeks. On Thursday it asked a federal appeals court in New Orleans to suspend a decision striking down Biden's plan, and in the same filing it announced plans to ask the Supreme Court to overturn a St. Louis appeals court that halted the plan.

Biden's plan promises \$10,000 in federal student debt forgiveness to those with incomes of less than \$125,000, or households earning less than \$250,000.

Pell Grant recipients, who typically demonstrate more financial need, are eligible for an additional \$10,000 in relief.

Keeping the debt relief on hold would leave the government with an "unnecessarily perilous choice," the administration argued in its filing Thursday. If it restarts student loan payments as planned on Jan. 1, millions of Americans will get billed for debt that was promised to be canceled. But if the government extends the payment pause, it will cost billions of dollars in lost revenue.

For typical borrowers, monthly payments would be \$200 to \$300 higher than they would be if Biden's plan goes through, the Education Department said. The strain could lead to soaring default rates, which have increased by an average of twentyfold in the wake of other natural disasters.

Trump Org. CFO testifies he kept two sets of books

NEW YORK — Allen Weisselberg, former chief financial officer at the Trump Organization, testified Thursday in Manhattan Supreme Court that he kept a handwritten list detailing the brazen tax fraud he committed in his top drawer at Trump Tower.

During his first full day on the witness stand, the convicted 75-year-old talked about keeping two sets of books when he ran the Trump company's finance department, his long-standing relationship with the famous family, and how he felt when the house of cards collapsed.

The Trump entities on trial have pleaded not guilty to an indictment alleging they helped Weisselberg and other senior executives dodge income taxes on more than \$1 million. Company lawyers say the CFO worked alone.

"Wasn't it your responsibility to protect the family from these kinds of problems?" asked Trump lawyer Alan Futerfas.

One of the agents was later pronounced dead. The agent's identity was not immediately released and the condition of the other two agents was not immediately clear.

At least 21 people killed in Gaza fire, officials say

GAZA CITY — A fire that swept through a family home in the northern Gaza Strip late Thursday killed at least 21 people, including children, authorities said.

The blaze erupted around 6 p.m. local time in the densely populated Jabalia refugee camp, the largest of eight refugee camps that dot the Gaza Strip. It killed everyone who was in the third-floor apartment at the time, according to Gaza's Interior Ministry.

Officials said the fire appeared to be an accident, based on preliminary investigations.

"Police forces, civil defense and forensic teams are still continuing their follow-up and investigations into this painful incident," the Interior Ministry said in a statement.

The ministry also said that authorities found a large gasoline cache in the home.



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



Man faces charges in fatal crash

CAMBRIDGE, Ill. - An Annawan man has been charged in Henry County Circuit Court with aggravated driving under the influence in connection with a Sept. 8 accident that resulted in a fatality.

Justin M. Kirchner, 21, has a Nov. 28 preliminary hearing scheduled in the case. He stated that he would hire private counsel.

The Class 2 felony charge was filed Oct. 21, and Kirchner was arraigned as to the charges and penalties by Judge Dana McReynolds on Nov. 9. If found guilty, he faces a prison term of 3-7 years, although the charge is also probationable.

According to the charge, Kirchner was driving a 2020 Ford on Illinois Route 78 in Alba Township with methamphetamine in his system when he was involved in a motor vehicle accident that was the proximate cause of the death of Jeanne Johnson.

He also faces traffic citations for driving too fast for conditions, failure to wear a seat belt and improper lane usage. According to those citations, the accident happened at 4:44 a.m. on Route 78, approximately 1,338 feet north of Engels Road.
