Wolf Carbon Solutions US, LLC (Wolf), with its principal place of business at 1600 Broadway #1900, Denver, CO, 80202, is proposing a Carbon Capture and Sequestration project, the Mt. 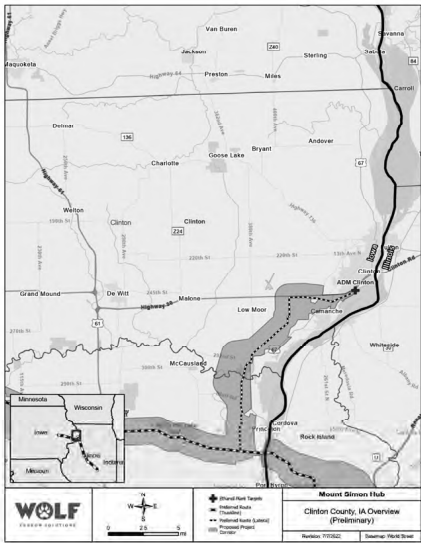

You have the right to attend informational meetings and to file comments and objections with the IUB if you choose. At the meeting, additional details regarding the purpose, timing and proposed routing of Mt. Simon Hub and information regarding the legal rights of landowners will be presented. Time will be given to address questions from attendees. The meeting is expected to last approximately one hour. Under Iowa state law, public IUB meetings must take place before potentially impacted landowners can be contacted directly by Wolf Carbon Solutions personnel. If you are unable to attend an informational meeting, a Wolf representative will be available to meet with you and talk through the same information shared publicly after public meetings have taken place. Details for the meeting being held in Clinton County are as follows:

To provide timely notice to all potentially impacted by the proposed Mt. Simon Hub, such as tenants or other interested parties, we ask that you provide contact information of any tenants or others that may have an interest in the land to 1-800-501-5597 or mtsimonhub@wolfcarbonsolutions.com, at your earliest convenience, so that Wolf Carbon Solutions personnel can notify them as well. Persons with disabilities, or those requiring assistive services or devices to participate in IUB informational meetings can request accommodation by contacting the IUB at 515-725-7300 in advance of the scheduled date. The IUB will also host a virtual informational meeting allowing you to attend and participate remotely. The virtual meeting will take place at 6:00 pm on September 19, 2022. Information regarding remote attendance is available on the IUB website, <https://iub.iowa.gov>, on the Hearing and Meeting Calendar webpage.

Following informational meetings, Wolf right-of-way (ROW) representatives will begin contacting landowners regarding routing land survey activities permission and easement negotiations. We may seek permanent easements, easements for temporary construction or access easements for the proposed project. Simon Hub route, though if we are unable to do so we may need to request the right of eminent domain, or condemnation, from the IUB. The IUB makes the decision whether to approve or deny the Mt. Simon Hub pipeline permit, including the right to use condemnation, through a separate public hearing process.

Goodell: Watson appeal was ‘right thing to do’

BEREA, Ohio – NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell said he feels the league needed to keep pushing for a year-long suspension for Cleveland Browns quarterback Deshaun Watson because of his “egregious” and “predatory behavior” toward women.

Speaking at the owners’ meetings Tuesday in Bloomington, Minnesota, Goodell addressed the league’s decision to appeal a six-game suspension given to Watson by Sue L. Robinson, a former federal judge appointed by the NFL and NFL Players Association as an independent league disciplinary officer.

Robinson found Watson violated the league’s conduct policy after he was accused by two dozen women of sexual assault or harassment while he played for Houston. Watson has settled 23 of the 24 lawsuits filed by the women, though he has denied any wrongdoing.

The league has been seeking an indefinite suspension and fine for Watson, and felt Robinson’s six-game ban wasn’t enough. Goodell cited the collective bargaining agreement for empowering the league to seek further discipline.

“Either party could certainly challenge and appeal that and that was something that we felt was our right to do as well as NFLPA,” Goodell said. “So we decided it was the right thing to do.”

Watson’s fate now rests with Peter C. Harvey, a former New Jersey attorney general handpicked by Goodell to handle the appeal. Harvey has previously worked as an arbiter in league cases.

Goodell said the league is pushing for a full-year penalty for Watson because of the evidence against the 26-year-old, who was accused of being sexually inappropriate with the women during massage therapy sessions while with the Texans in 2020 and 2021.

In her 16-page ruling, Robinson concluded Watson violated the league’s personal conduct policy with his behavior, using both “egregious” and “preda-

tory” to describe his actions. Goodell was asked why the league is seeking a harsher punishment.

“Because we’ve seen the evidence,” he said. “She (Robinson) was very clear about the evidence. She reinforced the evidence, that there was multiple violations here and they were egregious, and that it was predatory behavior.”

“Those were always things we felt was really important for us to address and in a way that’s responsible.”

Goodell doesn’t have a sense of when Harvey will issue a decision. There’s no specific deadline for Harvey, but the appeal policy requires that it be “expedited.”

There also remains the possibility the sides could reach a settlement.

While attending the meetings in Minnesota, Cleveland owner Jimmy Haslam had little to say about the ongoing appeal.

“We’ll respect and honor the process,” he told reporters.

Meanwhile, Watson’s playing status for the Browns’ exhibition opener is unknown.

Browns coach Kevin Stefanski didn’t reveal whether Watson will play in Friday’s game in Jacksonville. Stefanski said the team has a plan but he won’t make it public until he tells his players.

running backs) because they’ve been here and we’re learning about the others. But it looks like a good group.”

The first chance to see them in games comes Saturday, when the Chiefs visit Chicago for their preseason opener.

Edwards-Helaire, the 32nd overall pick in the 2020 draft, is the known quantity in Kansas City, where he has started 23 games over his first two seasons. He’s averaged nearly 4½ yards per carry, caught 55 passes and has proven that despite his small, 5-foot-8 stature that he can protect Patrick Mahomes from would-be blitzers.

His biggest problem, though, has been that he’s only played 23 regular-season games, thanks to a litany of injuries that put him on the sideline nearly as much as on the field. And along with missing seven games last season, Edwards-Helaire also missed the Chiefs’ wild-card game before serving as a backup to McKinnon in the divisional round and AFC title game.

“Clyde has done a heck of a job – a heck of a job – staying healthy this entire offseason,” said Chiefs offensive coordinator Eric Bieniemy, who spent nine seasons playing running back in the NFL. “At the end of the day we’ve just got to make sure that we’re emphasizing putting him in position to have an opportunity to make plays.”

What could give Edwards-Helaire an advantage in the race for the No. 1 job? His ability to catch the ball out of the backfield – “I am a thousand-and-ten percent confident in my hands,” he said – and his experience in Reid’s offense.

The playbook is thick. The terminology is complicated. The entire system takes time to learn.

Pacheco seems to be picking it up in

a hurry.

He was the 251st overall pick in April’s draft, which means only 10 players were selected after him, and his resume at Rutgers hardly made him a hot prospect. Pacheco only averaged 3.9 yards per carry last season, when he finished with 647 yards rushing for a 5-8 team, and he had a relatively modest 2,442 yards rushing in his four-year career.

Those numbers can be misleading, though. Pacheco was on a rapid rise before the pandemic caused chaos with his junior season, and the offensive line blocking for him the past few years wasn’t exactly the best in the Big Ten.

It was at the NFL scouting combine that Pacheco jumped onto the radar of scouts. He ran the 40-yard dash in 4.3 seconds, the best among running backs, and backed up that sizzling speed with good numbers in just about everything else.

Based on raw athleticism, many teams no doubt would have made Pacheco a priority among undrafted free agents had the Chiefs not spent a seventh-round pick on him.

But it was clear their gamble could pay off big as early as voluntary summer workouts, when Pacheco began turning heads in Kansas City every time he stepped on the field.

“The thing you’re guaranteed of is he’s going to run hard. That’s what he’s going to do,” Reid explained. “Will he have to learn the different schemes and how they work against certain defenses and at times be patient? He’ll learn that. But you’re guaranteed he’s going to run hard. He’s a good catcher. The rest of all that we can work with.”

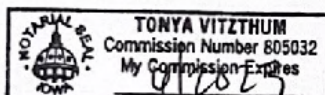

New York polio case connected to virus traces in UK and Israel

Public health officials’ international hunt for clues in the case of polio that paralyzed a New York man has turned up a big one: The virus that infected him matches the genetic fingerprint of poliovirus found in sewage samples taken in London and in the Jerusalem area, officials at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the World Health Organization told ProPublica on Friday.

It is not yet clear how the virus moved from one place to another or where it was first.

“That is still being investigated,” Oliver Rosenbauer, communications officer for WHO’s Global Polio Eradication Initiative, said in an email.

The hunt for answers in countries thousands of miles apart shows how viruses can hopscotch across the globe. Polio is highly contagious and, because the majority of infections cause no symptoms, it can circulate silently through communities where there is no routine monitoring.

ProPublica reported on Tuesday that U.S. public health agencies generally haven’t tested sewage for evidence of polio, relying on high vaccination rates to

protect Americans from the disease, but there are signs of cracks in that shield, both here and abroad.

Waiting for patients to show up with symptoms can be perilous: By the time there’s a case of paralysis, 100 to 1,000 infections may have occurred, public health experts say. New York health officials began screening wastewater only after the case there was identified.

The New York case was the first in the U.S. in nearly a decade. It was discovered after a young man in Rockland County, a suburban area northwest of New York City, sought medical treatment in June for weakness and paralysis. He had not been vaccinated against polio. It was well into July when tests confirmed he had polio.

Genetic sequencing confirmed that he had what’s called vaccine-derived polio. This kind of polio is linked to an oral polio vaccine that hasn’t been used in the U.S. since 2000. The oral vaccine, still used in other parts of the world, relies on weakened polio viruses to trigger the immune system and create protective antibodies. In rare instances, when the weakened viruses circulate in people who have not had the vac-

cine or are under-immunized, they can revert to a form that can sicken unvaccinated people.

Public health officials said the traces of polio-virus found in sewage samples from early June in Rockland County and greater Jerusalem were still too weak to cause paralytic polio. It’s not clear where the virus evolved, becoming powerful enough to cause the Rockland County patient’s illness.

A spokesperson for Rockland County’s Health Department said she could not confirm whether the man had traveled to London or Jerusalem this year.

How Polio Crept Back Into the U.S.

Another mystery in the case is that like the U.S., the U.K. hasn’t used the oral polio vaccine in years. Instead, both use only an injectable vaccine that contains inactivated viruses and cannot cause vaccine-derived polio. Though Israel does use oral polio vaccine, the version it uses does not contain the strain of polio, known as Type 2, that’s turned up in the sewage samples or that infected the New York man.

New York officials say they are now testing both stored sewage samples, which were collected as

part of the effort to track COVID-19, and more recent ones for signs of polio.

While high vaccination rates in the U.S. have made the risk of polio remote, some communities have far lower vaccination rates than the country overall. Rockland County in 2018 and 2019 struggled with an extended outbreak of

measles — also preventable with vaccination — that was concentrated in its Orthodox Jewish community. Some news organizations have reported that the man paralyzed with polio is a member of that community.

Most Americans aren’t old enough to remember, but in the first half of the

20th century, polio ranked among the nation’s most feared diseases. It victimized mostly young children, attacking their spinal cords, brain stems or both, and left thousands with irreversible paralysis. After the first vaccine was approved in 1955, U.S. cases dropped precipitously within a couple of years.

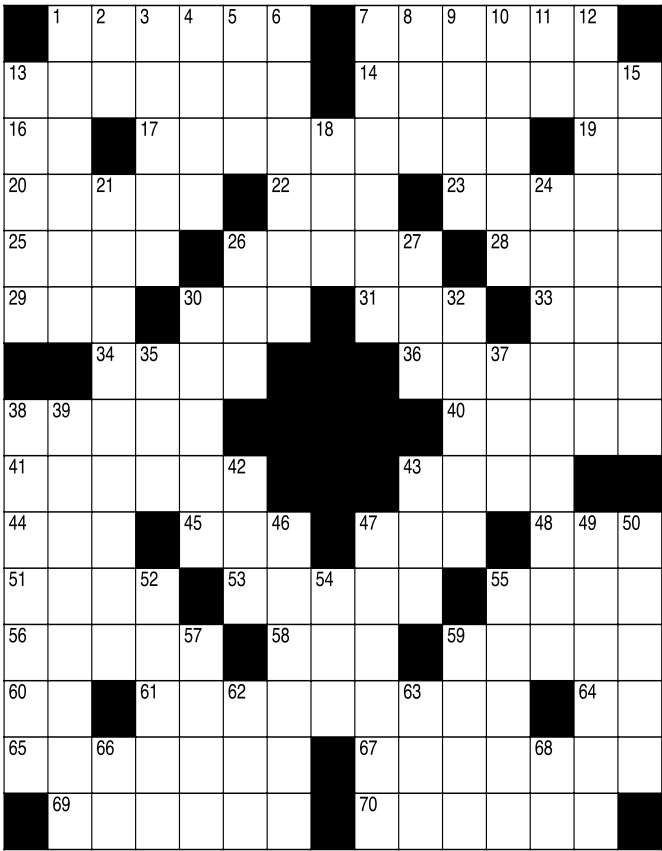

Linn County Auditor Miller: ‘Make voting easy again’

DES MOINES — Linn County Auditor Joel Miller, in campaign-ing Saturday at the Iowa State Fair, said he’s running for secretary of state to “make voting easy again.”

Miller said advocating for laws that make in-person and absentee voting easier would be his prime focus as secretary of state, the top elections official in the state. He criticized current Secretary of State Paul Pate, a Republican, for not opposing legislation that opponents said curtailed voting rights.

Iowa Republicans passed a wide-ranging voting law in 2021 that cut the state’s early voting period from 29 days to 20. The law also made general election polls close an hour earlier, required absentee ballots to arrive to county auditors by the end of Election Day no matter their postmark, and limited the options for county auditors to facilitate early and satellite voting. Proponents of the law said it was an effort to enhance election security.

Miller said the law prevented some people from voting, including in Linn County, where 101 voters missed the deadline to vote by mail. Of those, he said 51 people did not end up voting.

“If half the people don’t go vote that were planning to vote by mail, that’s a crisis for our democracy,” he said in a speech at the Des Moines Register Soapbox at the fair. “And Paul Pate was nowhere to be found.”

Miller would reject any further limitations to voting rights as secretary of state, he said. He proposed automatically registering Iowans to vote at 17 and automatically registering voters when they renew their driver’s license.

He said the state should institute permanent absentee ballot request forms, which would allow auditors to send absentee ballots to voters on a recurring basis, and allow for more than one absentee

ballot drop box in larger counties.

Miller also criticized Pate’s efforts to combat human trafficking, saying the initiative is outside his duties as secretary of state. Miller said he’s against human trafficking, but said there’s an office in the public safety department to focus on combating it.

“Yes he’s bringing visibility, but he’s wasting tax dollars,” Miller said. “Do you want to re-hire a secretary of state who’s been negligent, who has no leadership when it comes to election laws, the most important part of his job, and who’s out wasting taxpayer dollars?”

The Des Moines Register extended invitations to speak to all candidates for statewide and federal office, and Pate is not scheduled to speak at the Soapbox.

Pate is holding an informal “straw poll” at a booth in the Varied Industries Building at the fair, where fairgoers can show support for their preferred candidates, and the booth provides opportunities for voter registration.

“Paul Pate’s record of safe and secure elections speaks for itself,” Republican Party of Iowa spokesperson Kollin Crompton said in a statement. “Under Pate’s leadership, Iowa’s elections have seen increased turnout while improving election integrity. It’s why Iowa ranks third in the country for election administration.”

DeJear: Iowa faces crises in education, mental health

DES MOINES — Iowa’s public school and mental health systems are in crisis because of the leadership of Republican Gov. Kim Reynolds, Democrat Deidre DeJear said Saturday while campaigning at the Iowa State Fair.

DeJear, who is challenging Reynolds for governor this fall, said Reynolds is neglecting and underfunding critical services.

Reynolds and legislative Republicans boosted public K-12 education funding by 2.5 percent in 2022, which was less than the rate of record-high inflation. DeJear said not prioritizing public education has led Iowa to fall in its education standards.

“The leadership that exists right now at Terrace Hill is starving our systems,” DeJear said in a speech at the Des Moines Register Soapbox at the fair. “Literally starving our systems. She only gave our education budget a 2 percent increase. Inflation is at 8 percent. Meanwhile, our teachers, our educators, our bus drivers, our custodians, are walking away from the profession.”

DeJear said she wanted to provide education to 3- and 4-year-olds, and make sure high school graduates are prepared to go to college or technical schools.

DeJear also said there’s a crisis in access to health care and mental health care in the state. She cited Iowa’s low supply of psychiatric care and infrastructure. According to a March 2021 report, Iowa had 712 psychiatric inpatient beds.

The state should spend some of its \$1.24 billion budget surplus on funding these initiatives, DeJear said, and she criticized Republican leadership in the state for not doing enough with the money.

The surplus was one justification Republicans in the Iowa Legislature gave earlier this year to pass a sweeping tax rework, which will lower several of the state’s tax brackets and set a flat tax rate of 3.9 percent by 2026.

“That’s Iowa’s rainy day fund, and it’s raining in our state,” DeJear said. “On mental health care, on education, on health care, on child care. We have to have leadership that’s going to put your resources to work.”

The Iowa governor’s seat is rated firmly Republican by several election rating outlets. In the July Des Moines Register/Mediacom Iowa Poll, Reynolds led DeJear by 17 points, with 48 percent saying they would vote for Reynolds and 31 percent saying they would vote for DeJear.

“DeJear is a radical Democrat who stands for defunding the police, reckless spending and restricting freedom,” Iowa Republican Party spokesperson Kollin Crompton said. “While DeJear has spent her time tweeting, Kim Reynolds has been meeting with thousands of Iowans every day at the Iowa State Fair.”

DeJear has not called for defunding the police, and told Axios in January that law enforcement officers “deserve more than a pat on the back and a one-time \$1,000 bonus.”

The Register extended invitations to the Soapbox to all candidates seeking federal and statewide office, and Reynolds is not scheduled to make a speech.

This past week, DeJear challenged Reynolds to three televised debates, and said they would give voters a better picture of the candidates and the issues they represent. The governor’s campaign told The Gazette they’d be happy to debate and are working out the details.

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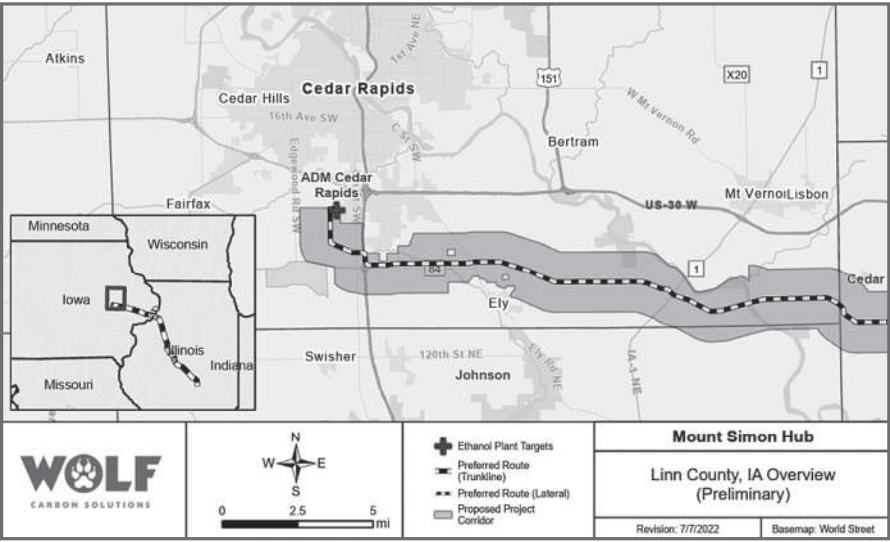

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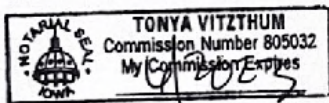

Answers to the Aug. 7 Puzzle



ACROSS

4. TASTED not wasted. The "uninterested family member" might "merely" TASTE the "meal," then stop eating it. The "food" would not actually be considered a waste until it was thrown out.
5. WORKS not words. "Long," detailed words are common in many types of courses, not just "English literature." The WORKS of noted poets and authors is a better answer.
7. POSTS not hosts. "Entertaining" is superfluous with host, since a host is someone who entertains guests in some fashion. POSTING an "entertaining" message on social media makes a good answer.
10. HEAD not hear. In all likelihood, if the "mayor" refused to hear delegates concerned about the "major housing shortage" in the city, it would "cause" anger. But not wishing to HEAD the "delegation" could do so.
13. FIRMS not forms. In order

for "fraud charges" to "be laid," FIRMS would have to be investigated and their forms studied. FIRMS is, therefore, a comprehensive answer.

15. AIR not aid. AIR is a straightforward answer. The clue word "help" makes aid unnecessary.

16. PLANE not place. Many average people have places reserved for them in restaurants and hotels, for instance. But a "celebrity" would be the type to "always" have an exclusive "PLANE" awaiting him.

18. KICK not nick. KICK is apt. The clue words "small one" are redundant with nick.

19. INFECTED not infested. The "hostel guest" could be INFECTED "by bedbugs." But the guest's room or bed would have been infested with "bedbugs."

DOWN

1. PAST not pact. There might be "contradictory historical accounts of" the PAST "agreement," but the pact would be as it was officially written.

2. LEANS not leaps. LEANS "out from behind" a "couch" is apt. The clue word "suddenly" is superfluous with leaps, which is defined as to move "suddenly."

3. JOB not mob. It would be clues from the "specialized" "crime" JOB that would lead the "detective" to link it to a "specialized" mob operation, making JOB the best answer.

6. LEARN not yearn. You don't necessarily have to be a particular sort of "student" to yearn "to perform"; people with a multitude of interests could have similar feelings. To LEARN, however, has a direct link to the clue word "student."

8. OLD not odd. "Curios" are, by definition, odd, making odd unnecessary in the clue. OLD is best.

9. TRAIN not trail. A trail ends or runs out, whereas a TRAIN stops, making TRAIN the best answer.

14. SHARKS not sparks. The clue words "long and detailed account" implies there was a prolonged buildup to the "tragedy," which links up well with a SHARK attack. SHARKS could have been seen circling the victim prior to the "tragedy," whereas sparks usually quickly cause a flame.

17. ICL not ire. ICL is best. The clue's reference to "hateful feeling" makes ire redundant.

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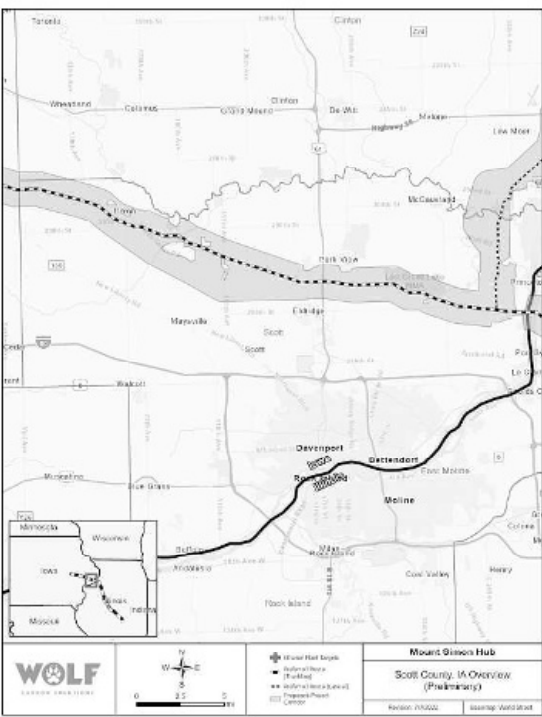
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
